#### **►** Workshop Description:

As an anaesthetic community, we have shared our scientific response to the pandemic across the world. But there were many other aspects to the pandemic, in particular the ways in which we all dealt emotionally and psychologically with illness, isolation and fear. Many resorted to creative projects that have now been forgotten. Others were so overwhelmed with work that they abandoned all creativity but may want to rediscover their creativity as they recover from the pandemic and its widespread implications. This is an opportunity to bring your creative projects, even those that are just an idea, to a forum where they can be shared, remembered, and potentially developed further.

» Did you write a journal, a half-finished novel, a poem, a play? Did you paint, create cartoons, sew, knit, make music? Would you like to do some of these things? We invite you to bring your projects – or the story behind them – and share with the other participants. This is a unique opportunity to discover the creative talent of our international community and to workshop with others to see where your project could go in the future.
